In calling his disciples, Jesus adjusted the focus of their lives by taking them from what they were already doing and changing the goal. For instance, he did not wait for Simon Peter to worship at the synagogue. He addressed Simon on his own turf. He used Simon's boat to preach to the crowds, then told him to lower his nets for a catch. Once Simon pulled up the huge number of fish, Jesus changed Simon's focus. Now he would be catching other people, not fish. He could still be a "catcher," just with a different goal. Similarly, Jesus called Saul when he had taken it upon himself to travel to Damascus to arrest Christians. Paul continued to journey fervently around the empire, but now to evangelize, not to persecute.

It is difficult to state any more clearly how complete a transformation Peter makes. Here is a man whose life centered on his profession. He owned his own boat. He fished through the night. He had partners in the trade. One would think that a fisherman like this would have a much different reaction to this enormous catch. Why not buy a larger boat with stronger nets and just hire Jesus to accompany him every day? But Peter's immediate reaction was a realization of Jesus' power and his own unworthiness. So when Jesus invited him, he left everything and followed.

How are we called to transform our life? Have we already transformed our life and feel called to encourage others to do so as well?

HUMAN TRAFFICKING AWARENESS

Each month the Pope asks the church to pray for a specific intention. This month, he has named the sin of **Trafficking** for our prayers.

For more than two centuries, the United States has worked to advance the cause of freedom. Stained from history of slavery and shaped by ancestors brought to this country in chains. Today, America shines as a beacon of hope to people everywhere who cherish liberty and opportunity. Still, our society remains imperfect, and our nation has more work to do to uphold these values. At home and around the globe, we must continue to fight for human dignity and the inalienable rights of every person.

Human trafficking is a complex and hidden crime, and therefore the true scale of it is difficult to determine. According to the United Nations News Centre, it's one of the most profitable crimes worldwide, second only to illegal drugs and arms trafficking, with an annual trade value of around \$32 billion. It is estimated there are nearly 21 million victims of forced labor, including forced sexual exploitation. It's a major concern that can go unchecked or unnoticed. As Christians, we need to be aware and not turn a blind eye to this current evil.
